Keep your battery awake while you car sleeps for the winter

Maintain your battery while you classic vehicle sleeps for the winter.

The most important consideration when storing a vehicle battery is to make sure the voltage never drops below 12.4 volts for a 12 volt battery or 6.4 volts for a 6 volt battery. Following these simple tips on battery maintenance can help extend the life of your battery. To do this, It is recommended to use a battery maintainer.

A battery maintainer is a device that will monitor the battery voltage and keep it at full charge during storage. A battery maintainer, also known as a float battery charger. A float charger is a device that keeps a battery charged by sending small amounts of current to it when needed. It maintains a battery's voltage at a preset level, usually around 2.25 volts per cell, without overcharging the battery. Most modern automatic chargers use microprocessors to help manage the charging process. Microprocessor controlled chargers use algorithms to monitor the charging process and make adjustments based on the information about the battery's current voltage and charge. Charging a battery in this manner doesn't negatively affect battery life or performance, it can even help prolong battery life. The best part about microprocessor controlled chargers is that they can be connected for a longer period of time. For safer, and more efficient charging, use a microprocessor controlled charger.

Trickle Chargers

A trickle charger is another type of maintenance charger. A trickle charger should only be left attached to a battery for a day or two out of the month. Unlike float chargers, they have no sensor to determine when or if the battery is charged. Like manual chargers, they'll continue to deliver current until disconnected running the risk of boiling the electrolytes out of your battery or damaging its plates through overcharging.

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Clean your battery prior to storage.

Prior to storage it is best to clean the battery. It is best to do this with the battery removed from the vehicle.

Disconnect the battery terminals. Always disconnect the negative cable first and the positive second. When reattaching the cables do just the opposite. Positive first than the negative, this will prevent damage to the battery or vehicle if the cable should touch the vehicle. Just a note of caution, some newer vehicles may have more than one battery.



To neutralize the corrosion you can make a paste using equal amounts of baking soda and water. Mix the solution in a clean plastic container until it becomes a paste. There are also commercially available battery cleaning products.

Scrub the battery and terminals. Use a cloth to clean the battery case and use an old tooth brush to clean around the terminals. For heavy corrosion you may need to use a wire brush. Note: when done discard the toothbrush, don't put it back in the bathroom.

Rinse the battery with clear water using a spray bottle or a sponge or a rag removing all the solution residue from the battery. Not removing all the residue can cause corrosion to reappear. Don't pour the baking soda solution over the top of the battery. Some of the solution may leak into the battery and neutralize the sulfuric acid inside the battery.

Dry the battery using a Micro fiber cloth. Also dry the terminals and cables.

Reconnect the battery cables in the correct order as described earlier. After the cables are reconnected you can apply a small amount of petroleum jelly on the terminals to prevent corrosion from reoccurring.

If your vehicle has a computer or electronic devices you may want to use a commercially available **memory** saver prior to disconnecting the battery. Follow the instructions that came with the memory saver.

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











